Dear 2018 - 2019 Westborough High School Concert Choir,

Congratulations on being selected through competitive audition to be a member of this ensemble! Since you are now a member of one of the audition-only WHS Choirs, you are required to do a little summer work for preparation for the 2018 – 2019 school year. This summer work really isn't "work," it is singing! This is designed for you to keep your vocal chords moving over the summer in order to stay in vocal shape over the next two months.

There are two pieces you need to learn over the summer. These are *The Star Spangled Banner*, arranged by Tim Sharp and *Giá il sole dal Gange* by Alessandro Scarlatti. I have many exciting ideas planned for Concert Choir this coming school year. Please have *The Star Spangled Banner MEMORIZED* for the first day of school. We will be performing this in front of the entire student body on the first day of school. The other piece in this packet is *Giá il sole dal Gange* by Alessandro Scarlatti. This piece is provided in both high and low voice – experiment with both keys and see which one fits your voice best. *Giá il sole dal Gange* will be used for the 2018 – 2019 Senior Districts Chorus Auditions, auditions for Chamber Singers at the beginning of September, and will be everyone's Quarter 1 Solo Recording Assignment. You are not required to learn this over the summer, but I provided it for you just in case you would like to get a head start and prepare for Chamber Singers auditions in early September.

On our website, **westboroughhighschoolchoirs.weebly.com**, I have provided you some tools to help you learn this music. These tools will be available by the end of the school year, June 21st. Under the "CHOIRS" tab there is a button for the page called "CONCERT CHOIR." Here you will see practice tracks for each voice part. **Use these tools** to help you learn the music! You also have a list of the membership for Concert Choir. Get together with some of your choir friends/acquaintances and work together to learn your parts this summer.

This packet contains:

- 1. Letter
- 2. Chart indicating what voice part you will sing.
- 3. The Star Spangled Banner by Francis Scott Key / arr. Tim Sharp
- 4. Giá il sole dal Gange by Alessandro Scarlatti (low voice and high voice) learn beginning up to m. 48

I would like to reiterate that this summer work is not meant to cause stress. It is designed for you to keep singing over the summer and have a very attainable goal of memorizing *The Star Spangled Banner*. These goals can be reached if you practice a few times a week for 15 – 30 minutes and use the tools I have created for you on the website (the practice tracks). Do not forget you can also get together with other Concert Choir members and practice together!

If you have any questions or concerns, please feel free to email me at your convenience. I do check my email regularly throughout the summer months. I hope you all have a wonderful summer and I am looking forward to working with all of you next school year! Practice, practice, and practice so we can make music together on our first day of school!

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# "Già il sole dal Gange"

#### from L'Honestà negli amori, lonesta neλ:λi amori

#### Poetic idea

"How happy the whole world is at sunrise!" The person singing is Saldino, a pageboy, in the opera *Honesty in Love Affairs*. He is alone onstage, admiring the sunrise. The scene is Algeria in North Africa. ("Dal Gange" is merely a figure of speech meaning the east.)

#### Background

Scarlatti was born in Palermo, Sicily, but he was sent to Rome at age 12 to study music. When he wrote this, his second opera, in 1680, he was 19 years old. He was already married and a father, and he had been appointed the music director to Queen Christina of Sweden, who lived in Rome.

The unique character of Roman society in the 1600s affected the creation of music there. The popes were the rulers of the Papal States; as guardians of public morality, some of them permitted theaters to operate, but others did not. Women almost never sang in public in Rome. Women could perform at private opera theaters maintained by wealthy persons, most of whom were relatives of popes and had received noble titles and important church posts.

This opera was sung for the first time in the palace of an exceptionally wealthy person who had no noble title, Giovanni Bernini (1598-1680). Bernini rose through his artistic talent and long service to many popes as a sculptor and architect. It is said that in his private theater Bernini designed the scenery, and he may have written the libretto of this opera. The preface to the libretto hints that the name, Felice Parnasso, which means "happy-one-who-has-reached-the-heights," was the pen name of someone famous.

The familiar edition was made by

Parisotti in Arie Antiche, vol. 2 (Milan: Ricordi, 1890), when the singing of long runs was somewhat out of fashion with singers and audiences. In order to modernize Scarlatti's music, Parisotti used repeated words to break up the runs, a practice that others also used into the early 1900s. This destroyed the symbolism of the word "sun" rising on a scale, and emphasized the insignificant word "Ganges." The aria became popular, but in a false and inferior form.


